Beyond the regular items, this Bulletin will attempt to include stimulating reading for mainstream contesters, both the Big Guns and the smaller caliber Sharp-Shooters abounding in the ranks of the SCCC. Included will be poignant excerpts from the newsletters of the other strong clubs in the country, plus an occassional item lifted from the National Contest Journal. Your new editor will attempt to wield the red pen accross the board so you're not bored with pages of reprints. Instead he hopes to offer items for Power Reading by Power Contesters in this, your new Power Bulletin.

Naturally, there will remain room for anything (stress 'anything') submitted to the Bulletin for publication, provided it is well thought-out, concise, and of specific interest to the readership of the Scoreboard.

It will be absolute policy here at the corporate offices of the SCCC that the new editor will be open to any and all suggestions and criticism. What he does with it after that, however, will be up to him....

EDITORIAL

Boy, is this going to be fun. I have wanted to do this for a long time. The Southern California Contest Club has long been very close to my heart. Now I have an opportunity to have the biggest effect on it I ever have.

You may think that the President would be the one to hold that honor. Well, take it from me, I've been President of this club and I know otherwise. It's the Bulletin Editor who gets them where they sit. The Bulletin Editor gets into everyone's shack and sits on their desk all month and makes subtle comments on the state of their hobby. Like I said: boy, is this going to be fun.

I am looking forward to helping move the Southern California Contest Club into the next few years as a leader of trends, not a follower. I have a great concern for the state of our hobby and its future. I see big trouble all

I like to think I know what amateur radio is about. Quite honestly, I understand full well I can't profess to know EVERYTHING about what it's ALL about. But I have an idea of what we used to have that's missing nowadays.

THE PROBLEM

Ham Radio was created to facilitate people's experimenting with radio. Back when it wasn't illegal, many tinkerers got on the air and caused a lot of confusion. The government realized they'd better join 'em since they couldn't beat 'em. Amateur Radio was born. Then something awful happened. All of us serious radio types sat around enjoying radio tinkering by operating DX, contests and traffic while the rest of the technological world caught up with us and passed us up.

Simply put, the appeal of ham radio has changed from the 'magic' of far-off signals and strange propagation, to the convenience of VHF and Digital Communications (nothing magic about that).

As an example: nowadays, when we're stuck on the freeway, the guy in the car next to us can call home and say he's going to be late as easily as we can, and he doesn't even have a license. If he's so inclined, he can go out, easily get a ticket, and save himself all that car-phone expense. Ham radio is becoming a means rather than an end. Getting a license is becoming so easy, and the basic limited priveleges broad enough that our hobby now represents nothing more than a convenience item to a lot of new hams. I think many of them don't know the meanings of DX, contesting, or even HF. Traffic is limited to the freeway.

Ham radio is changing a whole lot, and many of us refuse to take notice. Well, boys, ignoring it won't make it go away. Whether or not contesters approve of the direction ham radio is going simply does not matter. We may be the best, but there aren't enough of us to make any difference.

THE SOLUTION

In my opinion, the cure for "the waywardness of ham radio" is very obvious. Not easy, but obvious. I think that DXers, contesters, and traffic handlers make the best all around hams (this is an editorial, remember?). And if we want to make our lives better, we should do what we can to get more DXers, contesters, and traffic handlers. Obvious, no?

The sure-fire way to keep things the way they're going is to keep ignoring it. Clearly, the only way we can make a difference is to do it ourselves. I believe the Southern California Contest Club has the potential to make a difference - and if there is ANY group I would

trust to do all the right things, it would be us. Here are some of the things we could do:

We can support new blood in our hobby, ensuring new operators continue persuing their operations to the betterment of us all. A program of tracking the progress of never-before-heard competitors through contest results will indicate which new operators make good prospects.

We can actively advocate striving for the highest standards we can in accuracy and ethical operation.

We can make a victory in these competitions more meaningful than it presently is.

We can lend our support to the newly formed World Radio Sport Federation. Their goal is not so much to encourage radio contesting as is it to get youngsters interested in ham radio by organizing a World Championship from the ground up, and publicizing it nationally and internationally via mass media. Very ambitious, end in my humble opinion, a very good idea.

Here's our only snag: all these great ideas listed above are at present inconsistent with our Club's Bylaw. (We only have one Bylaw). In my opinion (those words again) the SCCC are the right guys for the job, but we need to decide as a whole that we want to get more ambitious.

These things also will cost a fair bit of money. At our last meeting we realized that our club has the potential to raise as much if not more than the YCCC does with K1EA. This could be a very good thing, if we choose to persue it.

If, on the other hand, we sit around eating pizza and drinking beer for the rest of our useful lives, we may be doing nothing short of spelling our own demise.

BUT SERIOUSLY, FOLKS ...

I guess maybe this editorial is a bit strong. Well, don't worry, we've got some time yet. What I really wanted to say was the following:

Ever since we announced I would be taking over the duties as Bulletin editor and publisher. I have been swamped by a ton of support from club members who have ideas to contribute, and I want to take a few inches to publicly thank everyone to date - forgive me if I forgot you, I am typing this off the top of my head as I struggle to get this first issue out.

Ski, N6ADI, who as the editor before me for 6 years, sometimes singlehandedly carried the club torch from meeting to meeting and contest to contest, and under whom the club roster grew from 40 to over 90. Good job, old boy.

Dennis, NE6I, for sending me the SDDXC bulletin with his comments and the article about W6YA among others, as well as the score and summary sheet of every contest he's been in this season - if everyone did this it would make my life simpler, but I guess I'll have to get on packet anyway.

At the start of the contest you are confident, knowing that, in the beginning, all scores are created equal (sorry about the mixed metaphor). At the end of the contest, you realize that all opertors/stations/QTHs are not created equal. This paradox was never more true for me than during the last CW Sprint:

Friday, 2300 - Things are looking good. Just called K6JYO and confirmed the availability of his FB station for the Sprint. CW roster has been faxed to Trey. Due to last minute drop outs, I fill in on SCCC #1. "Don't screw up."

Sunday, 0445 - Arrive home. Wife asks "How was it?" "Had a blast," I reply. "Can't wait until the next one!"


